Conclusion

APC's and Transformative Agreements are inherently problematic for Canadian OA publishing because :

- → They create inequalities (globally)
- They represent a huge investment in commercial publishers
- → Canadian OA publishing is primarily Diamond OA and requires its own investment

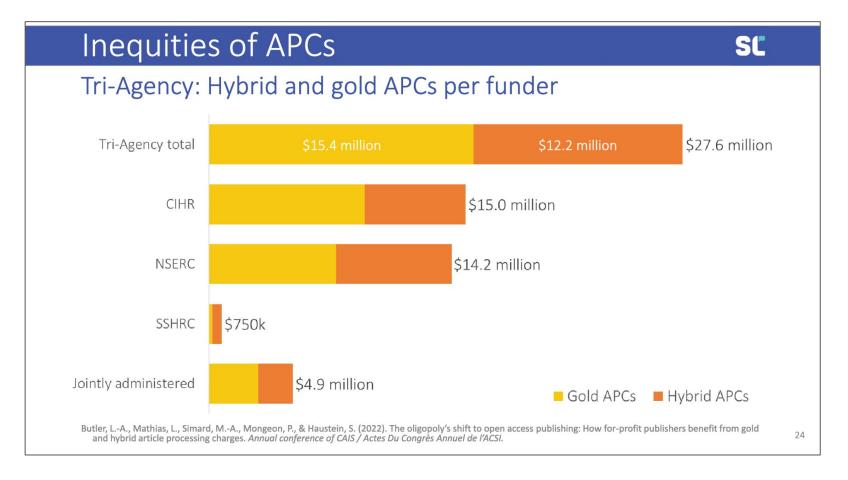

Inequities of APCs

SC

Systemic problems

- → Dependencies on proprietary infrastructure
 - → Knowledge as commodity
 - → Prestige of publishers
 - → Academic reward system
 - → Hiring, tenure and promotion

- → Exacerbating existing inequities
 - → Geography
 - → Gender
 - → Career stage
 - → Language
 - → Discipline
 - → Funding
 - → Diverse forms of knowledge

Inequities of APCs



BOAI 20th Anniversary Recommendations

- 1. Host OA research on open infrastructure
- 2. Reform research assessment and rewards to improve incentives
- 3. Favor inclusive publishing and distribution channels that never exclude authors on economic grounds
 - Take full advantage of OA repositories an no-APC journals ("green" and "diamond" OA). Move away from article processing charges (APCs).
- 4. When we spend money to publish OA research, remember the goals to which OA is the means
 - Favor models which benefit all regions of the world, which are controlled by academic-led an nonprofit organizations, which avoid concentrating new OA literature in commercially dominant journals, and which avoid entrenching models in conflict with these goals. Move away from read-and-publish agreements.

What is Diamond OA

Refers to a scholarly publication model in which journals and platforms do not charge fees to either authors or readers.

They:

- → represent community-driven, academic-led and -owned publishing initiatives,
- → serve a fine-grained variety of generally small-scale, multillingual, and multicultural scholarly communities, thus embodying the concept of bibliodiversity, and
- → are equitable by nature and design.

The landmark "Open Access Diamond Journals Study" of 2021 uncovered the vast size and scope of the Diamond OA publication ecosystem.



- → An archipelago of 17k 29k journals (11.5k in DOAJ)
- → 60.6% in SSH, 17.1% in medicine, 22.2% in science
- → 44% of OA journal publishing, and 8-9% of total publishing volume worldwide

Conclusion

Most scholarly journals published in Canada are **NOT** owned by large, for-profit commercial publishers.

University-published or library-hosted journals represent a significant percentage of the total number of journals published in Canada.

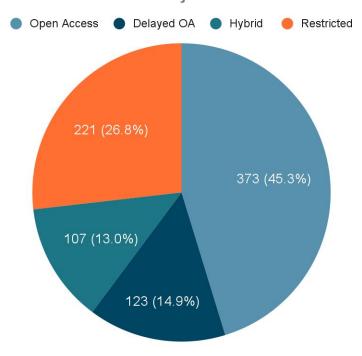
→ In Open Access

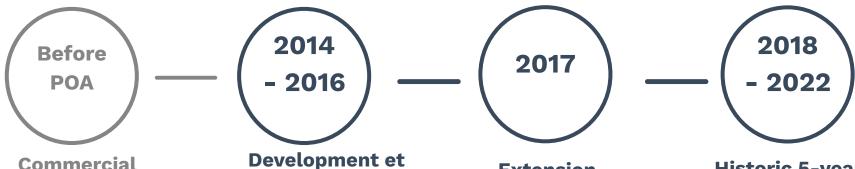

The POA is **an agreement between university libraries and scholarly journals** designed to provide ongoing financial support to humanities and social sciences journals, in an equitable and sustainable open access environment.

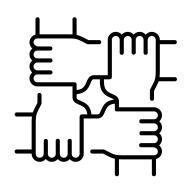

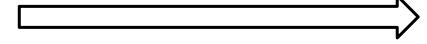

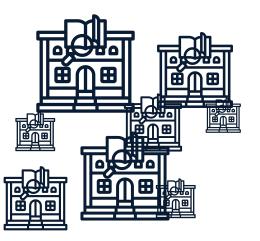
70% direct support funds for journals30% to cover service provided by Érudit

The importance of national journals

"...the academic community uses national journals as frequently as the leading international journals and much more often than those published by most of the top publishers."

"...Canadian and Quebec academic journals are used to disseminate research findings on **national topics** and are referenced, on average, much more often than their international counterparts."

Canadian Journals provide a unique showcase for Canadian research



Canada-focused article, published in the <u>Canadian</u>
<u>Journal of Higher Education</u> and mentioned on CBC website.



National journals allow for the dissemination of knowledge on local topics

Disciplines such as history, law, education and public health are typically strongly rooted in national politics, geography and culture.



Article published in *Ontario History*, 85% of downloads are performed by Ontarians

III. Conclusions

Diamond OA is not an alternative in Canada, it is THE model of Canadian journal publishing.

And widespread throughout the world!

Main challenges

Diamond OA is held back by **challenges related to the technical capacity, management, visibility, and sustainability of journals and platforms**.

Main recommendation

More dialogue and commitment are needed between researchers, Research Funding Organisations (RFOs), Research Performing Organisations (RPOs), university libraries, university presses & departments, scholarly societies, and ministries.
