## Formative questions

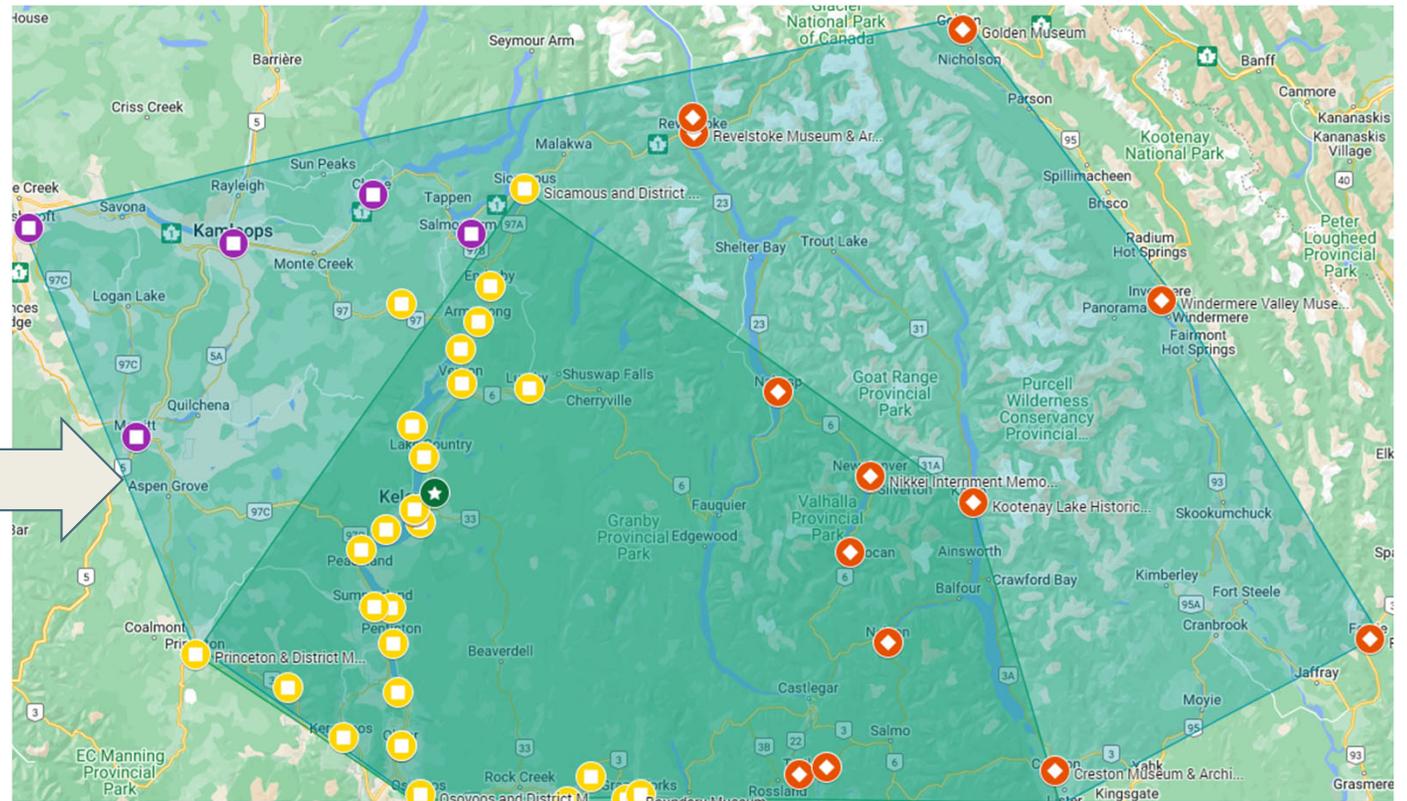
- What are community challenges?

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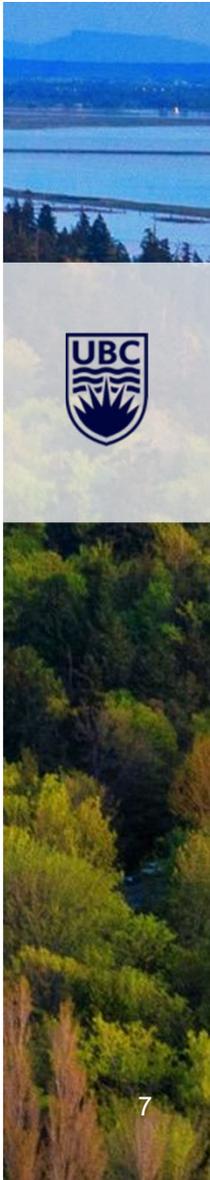

# Defining ourselves

## MISSION & VISION

- Increase the **collective capacities** of museums and archives in BC's southern interior
- Enhance **access to archives and other primary sources**
- Construct and support a **network** of heritage organizations

## VALUES

- **Include:** many partners may have only developing archival knowledge but carry unique, irreplaceable knowledge of their community histories
- **Reduce barriers, pursue economy-at-scale:** many partners are under-resourced
- **Contribute:** to a durable **cultivation of the archival record**

## Operating Principles

- The Library can deliver value to communities through the sharing of its expertise and infrastructure

- Digital practice is difficult, and collaboration eases the difficulty.



# Components

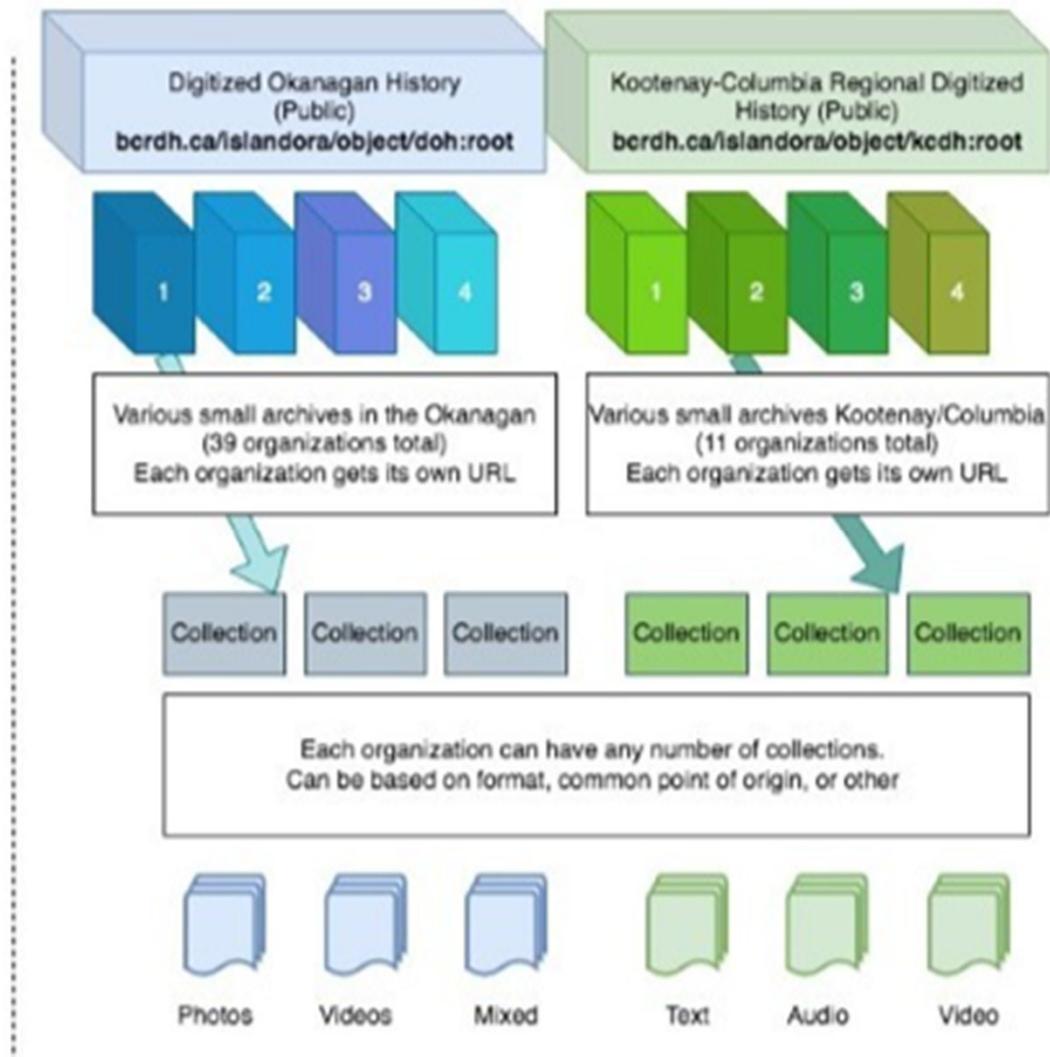




## Summary of components

- Shape: Application of archival concepts and structures to representations of digitized and digital content in the online environment
- Direction: Association and alignment with established collecting mandates
- Methods: Development of customized procedures and roles to emphasize conservation of limited resources
- Rules: Determination of technical standards as means rather than ends.

# Shape



- All cross-searchable  
Clearly attributed to
- Containing collection
  - Custodial org.



## Direction

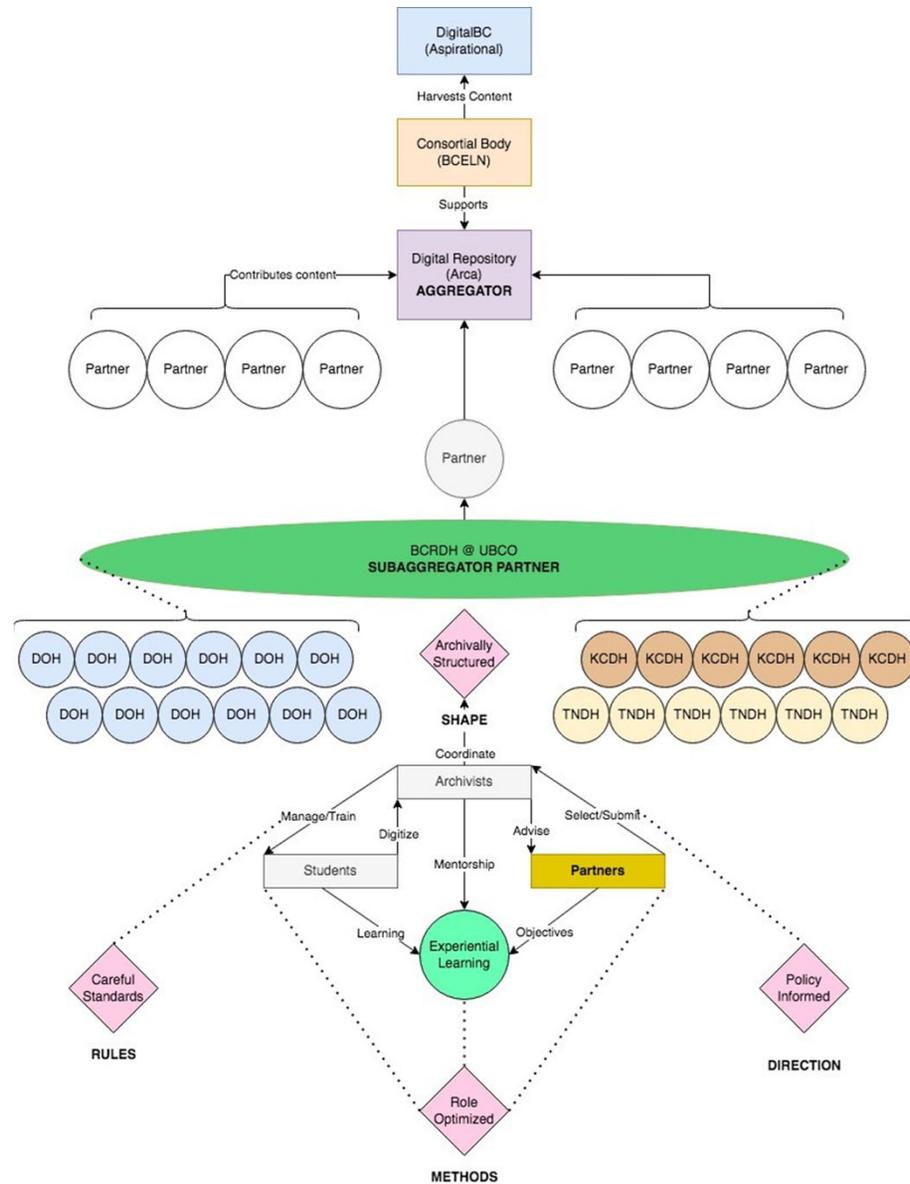
- Tied to a supported collection development policy
  - Geographical / regional
- Are we lucky or is this obvious?
  - Finding common ground with potential partners has been relatively easy
- Thinking flexibly about ownership
  - Our grasp can exceed our reach, to positive effect
  - Compatible with the Principles of OCAP
- Implications in determining the limits of stewardship
  - Digital preservation



## Methods - Membership has its rewards

- Partnership with Arca, BCELN's digital repository shared service
- “We’ll Get There Together” (2019): extension of hub-and-spoke model, new level for BCRDH as a regional “sub-aggregator”
- Similarities, and differences, with other sub-aggregators:
  - BC History Digitization Program
  - UBC School of Information

# Rules

- Defining *Quality, Quality Controls, and Quality Assurance*
- Role for BCRDH as data cleaner, data enhancer
- Identifying and leveraging available technological affordances
- Linking digital preservation to a more holistic picture

# Conclusion & Discussion





## Lessons

- Shape
  - Examine the interplay between archival digital object surrogates and descriptions at the aggregate level versus opportunities for reflection in a DAMS platform
  - Examine the role, value, and limits of digitization sampling for access where comprehensive digitization is infeasible
- Direction
  - Examine the strengths of existing mandates and explore where these can be updated to better steward digital and/or non-owned resources
- Methods
  - Examine this question: what is the work to be done, and who will do the work?
- Rules
  - Quality is participant in a larger value equation.



## Risks

- Consortial membership & migration to Islandora 2
- Changes in resource modelling
- Narrow focus -- emphasis on build rather than use
- Narrow representation -- portal content poses its own problems
- Partnership dynamic -- is their failsafe our risk?
- Loss of control of assets
- Gaps in documentation and strategy
- Volunteerism, tacit regional historical knowledge is waning and the opportunities for capturing description are decreasing



## Next Steps and Transitions

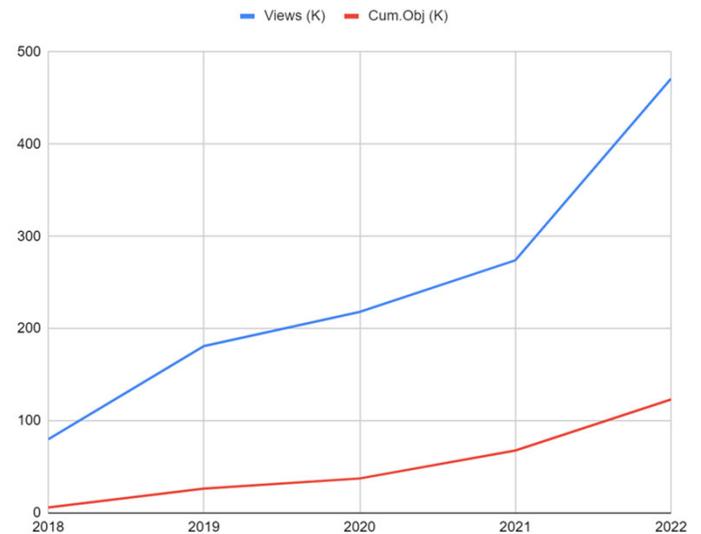
- Close out open projects
- Islandora 2 migration with Arca
- Characterize opportunities for ongoing resourcing
- Enhance digital preservation program documentation
- Focus on outreach and communications, emphasize teaching & research
- Reassess needs and consider new areas of potential



## Final comments

- Whole greater than the sum of the parts
- We all benefit
- Traffic is now increasing at a rate greater than actual growth. Is this meaningful?
