


- How has the decrease in value of the CAD against the USD affected Canadian academic libraries?

  - Telephone interviews conducted with 22 survey respondents


#### **Results: Annual Collections Budgets of Survey Respondents**




# **Results: Five-Year Trends in Annual Collections Budgets of Survey Respondents**




### **Results: Percentage of Collections Budgets Allocated to E-Resource Subscriptions**




# **Results: Surveyed Libraries' Responses to the Decreasing Value of the Dollar**

# **Results: Survey Respondents' Perceptions of Libraries' Responses to the Decrease in Value of the Canadian Dollar**



- Predictability important for budgetary planning
- Monograph funding an area of concern
- Further e-resource cancellations very likely
- Other financial pressures
  - Budget cuts
  - Program expansion without increased funding
  - Inflation of e-resource subscriptions

"As libraries, we have a huge opportunity right now.... We can leverage the problematic exchange rate to our advantage to have a conversation about the unsustainability of the current scholarly communication model. My fear is that everything will be too caught up in the US exchange rate, and we as a community will spend too much time talking about that, and not enough time leveraging that opportunity to talk about what I think the real issue is, which is the scholarly communication crisis."

"Even if the dollar rises a bit in the next year, the structural problem is still there, and therefore, we have to look at developing a sustainable approach in-house, as well as collaborating at the provincial and national level on strategies that we can work on collaboratively to make the environment more sustainable for all of us."

#### **Results: Interview Highlights**

- Should not conflate the two distinct issues
- Open access movement the most promising solution
- Informing faculty and university administrators important
- Cooperation at the consortial or interconsortial level necessary
