



### McMaster University

- Founded as the Toronto Baptist College in 1881 and officially incorporated as McMaster University in 1887
- Until 1957 was a Baptist-run institution.
- Motto and Coat of Arms reflects the influence of Western European Christian tradition. Our campus continues to be home to the McMaster Divinity College.

# University Library and Health Sciences Library

- Administratively separate but work collaboratively on collections, particularly in interdisciplinary subject areas and programs
- The Health Sciences Library covers the health professions, subjects related to human health and research, and serves as the archives for the Faculty of Health Sciences and Hamilton Health Sciences hospital corporation.
- The University Library covers all other disciplines on campus, is a repository for Canadian government documents, and houses and manages archival materials, maps, and other specialized collections.
- For the past few decades the acquisition units have attempted to minimized duplicate purchases. For example, if a health title was owned by the University Library it would not likely be purchased by Health Sciences.

At first glance it might seem difficult to see how libraries have contributed to Canada's history of assimilation and colonialism. Looking deeper at how books and education were used as tools to force both assimilation and enfranchisement through the Indian Act shows a history of Western systems pushing out Indigenous Knowledge practices. Indigenous ways of knowing, and the transfer of knowledge, were not understood or recognized as legitimate.

### Collection analysis

- Titles of subdivisions were reviewed, and ranges identified that are relevant to Indigenous Health topics in LCSH Class R and NLM Classification W
  - Example: WF 200-415 Tuberculosis
- A list of keywords were identified to search for Indigenous materials within these ranges.
  - Similar term list for INDIGENOUS: Métis, Inuit, Cree, Aboriginal...
  - Key terms in Indigenous Health research: Trauma informed, Social Determinants of Health, Sweat Lodges...
- Lists were created for titles matching the keywords in field 245
- Matches were captured including relevant fields: call number, location, record number, 245, 650, etc.
- Other searches ran in 'non-medical' LCSH ranges using a list of key terms in Indigenous Health research:
  - E 75-99 Indians of North America





# Materials in this collection and the language that describes them may be harmful.

Libraries and archives collect materials from different cultures and time periods to preserve and make available the historical record. As a result, library materials, such as those presented here, may reflect racist and misogynoir views that may be harmful and difficult to view.

The content featured in this collection explores linkages between Black women's suffrage and other social causes of the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries (antislavery, anti-lynching, education reform and civil rights) as well as racism within the Suffrage Movement. These materials are presented here to recognize and celebrate the important contributions of Black women and their resiliency in the face of ongoing racism and exclusion.



#### - Frequently asked questions

#### Where does this content come from?

Digital Public Library of America collects and makes freely available materials from thousands of libraries, archives, museums, and other cultural heritage organizations across the United States. Each institution or contributor shares materials with the DPLA according to its specific policies and objectives.

### Why does this potentially harmful content exist?

The Black Women's Suffrage Collection includes depictions and records of people experiencing trauma and harm. These materials are collected and preserved as part of the American historic record. Librarians and archivists must balance preservation of this history with sensitivity to how it is presented to users.

## Classification system

CFLA-FCAB Truth and Reconciliation Committee's Call to Action #5:

Decolonize Access and Classification by addressing the structural biases in existing schemes of knowledge organization and information retrieval arising from colonialism by committing to integrating Indigenous epistemologies into cataloguing praxis and knowledge management

### **Brian Deer Classification System (BDCS)**

- Kahnawá:ke librarian Brian Deer (d. 2019) developed his classification scheme to adequately describe and organize Indigenous materials
- He implemented his classification at numerous libraries during his career
- A great strength of BDCS is its ability to be modified to meet both the needs of individual collections, and specific geographies and Indigenous groups
