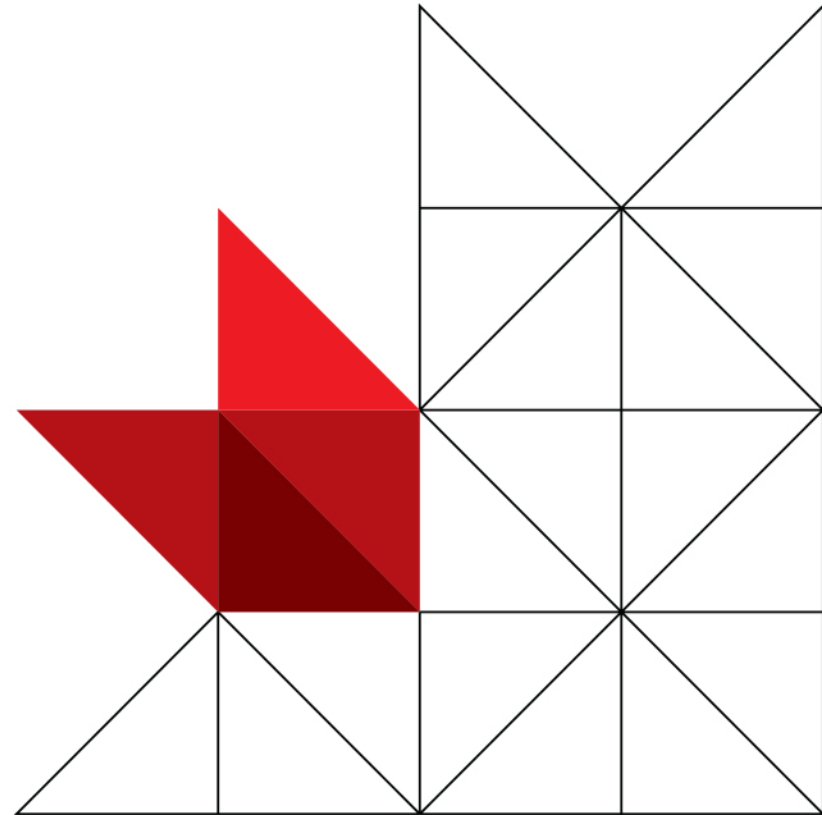

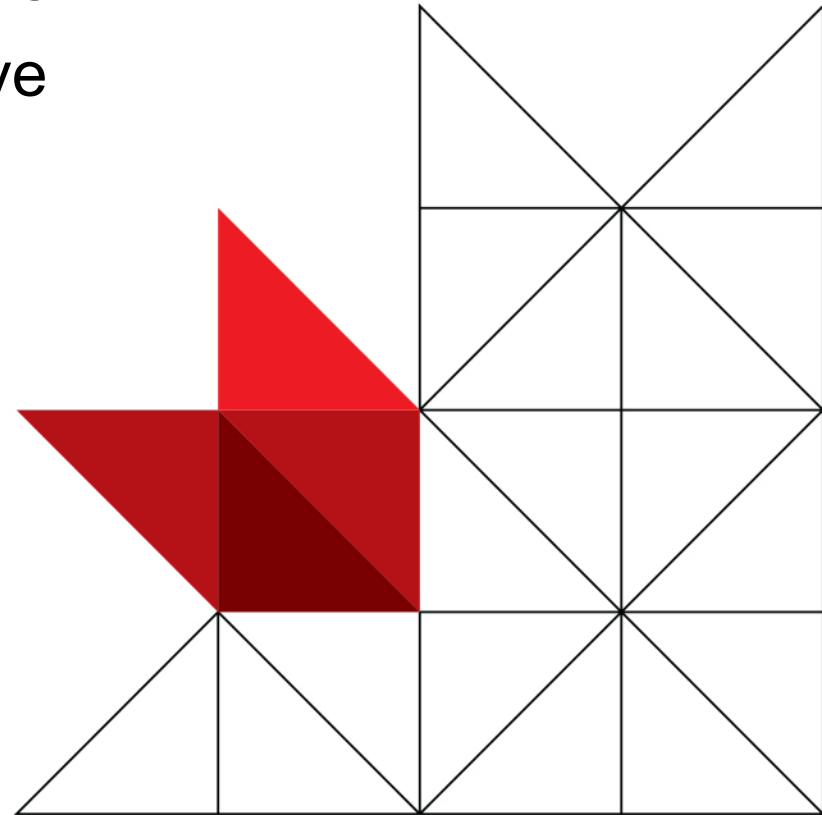
# CSP History

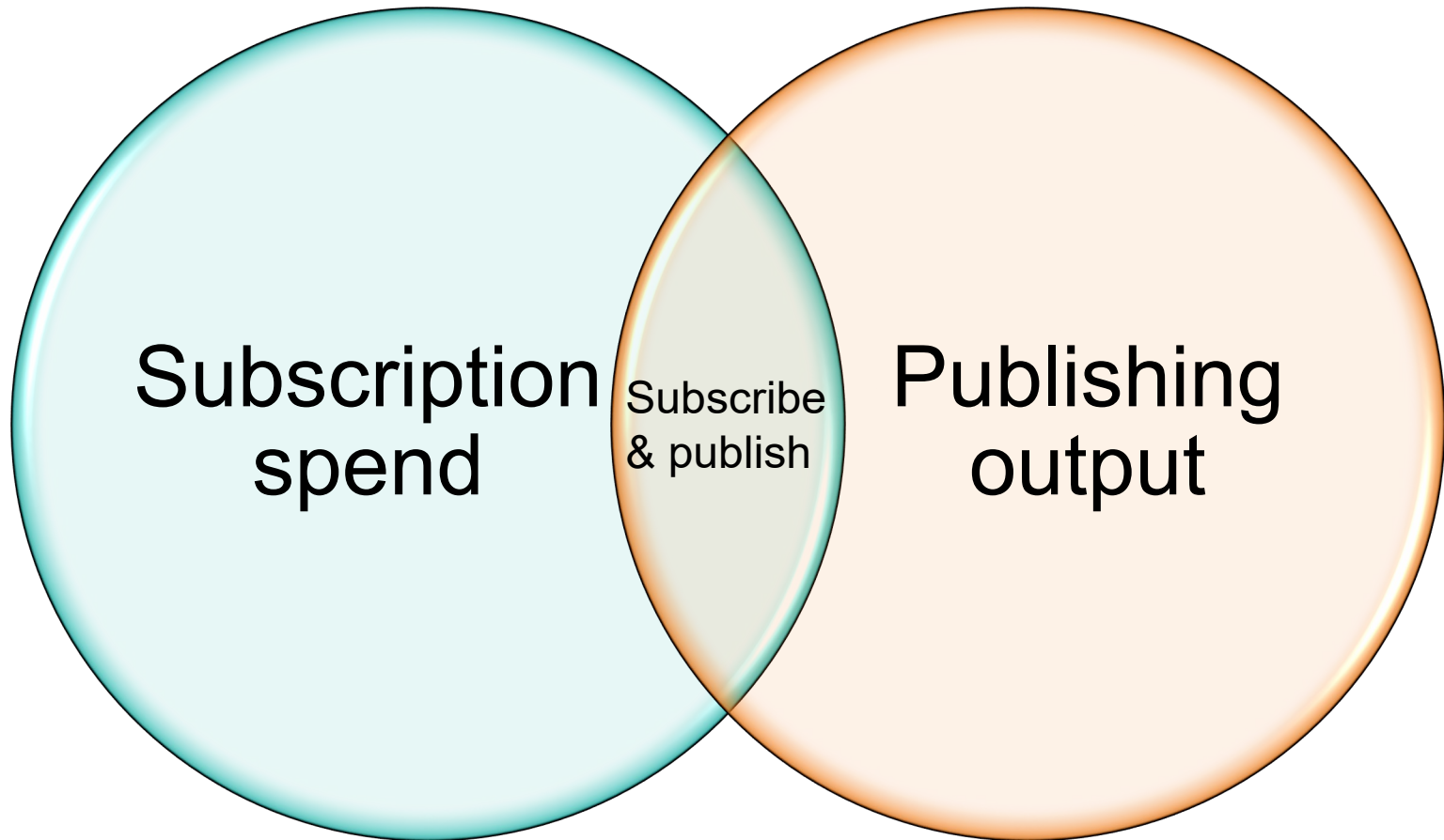




# Transformative agreement partners

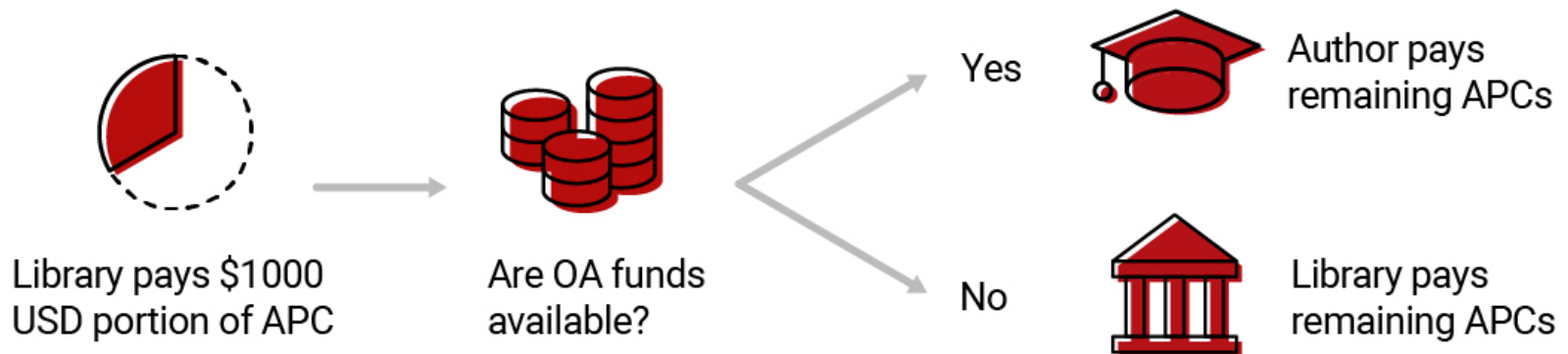
- Philosophical alignment
  - Readiness for OA
- Co-develop models w/ data-driven approach
  - Pilots: Experiment, learn, adapt
  - Monitoring, reporting, transparency
- Practical considerations
  - Model & pricing structure
  - Publishing output vs subscription spend
    - Certain institutions or regions

# CSP & University of California

- Read & publish agreement
  - Enables OA publishing by default
  - Read portion includes all subscription content
- Multipayer model
  - Cost-sharing approach removes barriers to authors who wish to publish open access in CSP journals





# Preparing for an open future

- Transformative journal status for 12 hybrid journals
  - Enables another compliance route
  - Helps CSP to transition journals to OA
    - Fair pricing policy
- Augmenting CSP's infrastructure
  - New roles, workflows, and systems to improve author and librarian experience
- Innovate & experiment
  - Grow our journals & launch new ones
  - New partnerships, explore and pilot OA business models

# Can we advance OA in Canada?

- Unite stakeholders to advocate for OS & OA in Canada
  - Keep pace in the global move to OA
- Funding to support the transition
  - Library budgets tight
  - Funder budgets static
  - Small publisher costs are increasing; risks
  - Can external support help to accelerate the transition?
- Partnerships will be key to a sustainable open future
