Accessible publishing activities



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Marrakesh Treaty:

- To facilitate access to published works for persons who are blind, visually impaired or otherwise print disabled
- First users' rights treaty - based on human rights principles
- A WIPO treaty, agreed upon at a Diplomatic Conference on June 27, 2013 in Marrakesh, Morocco
- Entry into force in Canada on September 30, 2016; in USA on May 8, 2019

Marrakesh Treaty:

- Each country must ratify; 89 ratified to date

- MT created an exception to copyright, with mandatory exceptions in national ratifying legislation
 - Allows the making and distribution of accessible format copies
 - Allows for the sharing of accessible works internationally
 - Permits the circumvention of technological protection measures

Legal Framework for Marrakesh Treaty

- Each Marrakesh Treaty country must develop national enabling legislation that complies with the requirements of the Treaty
 - Variation in legislative language among countries
- Marrakesh Treaty has optional articles;
 - Canada added a commercial availability clause and a royalties clause, and the U.S. did not
- Numerous initiatives are underway with Canadian authorized entities (AEs) (BAnQ, CELA, NNELS, and libraries) to understand how the legislation is operationalized in their processes and for international lending
- Legal experts in Canada and U.S. are engaged with us on the processes and implications of the differences in national law.

CARL-ARL Marrakesh Treaty Implementation

- September 2020 - CARL and ARL pilot implementation on behalf of member libraries (140 total); collectively hold 760 million print and electronic books
- Four pilot libraries: Cornell University, University of Florida in US and York University, Bibliothèque et Archives nationales du Québec (BAnQ)
- Policy, Metadata, Systems, Beneficiary working groups
- Goals:
 - Implement discovery and delivery within each country and cross-border
 - Identify and resolve barriers

Project Considerations

- High quality descriptions ensure that end-users can locate and access accessible format works
 - Identify best practices for description of accessible formats
- Unfettered access to accessible works by beneficiary communities
 - Convert from print to accessible version once
 - Determine how the plethora of accessible versions created by all library types, globally, are searchable and discoverable by all beneficiary users

Project Considerations

- Develop a framework for:
 - Adapting formats of works as users and technology change over time
 - Ongoing reinvestment into technology infrastructure for description of works and accessible, digital works

- 56 active vendor licences
 - 23 reviewed
 - Exclusions: databases, services, select backfiles

- 3 do not use model Licence
 - No accessible format clause
- Using model licence
 - All contain accessible format reference
 - 1 license clause “intentionally deleted”
