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MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

Throughout my first year as Chair of the Board of Directors, I have had the pleasure of witnessing exciting new initiatives and innovative collaborations come to life at CRKN. As the Canadian knowledge sector rebounds from the disruptions of the pandemic with an invigorating drive to enable world-leading research and innovation, CRKN has an increasingly vital role to play.

Through CRKN's strong licensing negotiations, researchers at member institutions can access the journal articles and scholarly outputs that they need to strengthen their own research programs. And now, with new read and publish agreements, these researchers can also make their research available open access at no cost to the researcher, levelling the playing field and bringing our cutting-edge Canadian research to the global community. CRKN has also continued to invest in building a strong and vibrant Canadian publishing ecosystem, through partnerships with not-for-profit publishers to enable a strong open access future for Canadian publishing. As we begin to wrap up our current 2019-2024 strategic plan and prepare for the next, we are increasing our focus on open access advocacy, including sharing community-developed tools and building relationships with collaborators that represent the research community and its needs.

As part of our work to support researchers, CRKN has been leading the Canadian persistent identifier (PID) community. Working with our colleagues at institutions across Canada, we have begun developing a national PID strategy that will support the adoption and management of persistent identifiers in Canada. With PID strategies already developed in countries such as the United Kingdom and Australia, Canada has a clear opportunity to develop a set of principles and goals for PID use in Canada to reduce the administrative burden on researchers and enable an interconnected open access future.

Over the past year, CRKN's heritage activities have coalesced around Digital Collections of the Future, the ambitious project to evolve Canadiana into distributed digital infrastructure that supports access to Canada's rich and diverse cultural content. CRKN is delighted to be partnering with the University of Ottawa as the administrative lead institution for a Canada Foundation for Innovation (CFI) Innovation Fund proposal and has, over the past year, developed strong governance structures to support this project. By developing this critical infrastructure, CRKN will enable innovative and inclusive research that responds to our most urgent societal and technological challenges.

As I have seen throughout my first term as Chair, these immense projects could not have taken shape without the support of CRKN's member community. Bringing together 85 libraries, research institutions, and non-profit organizations under the same vision is no small feat, and CRKN has done so expertly, thanks to its skilled Board, committees, task groups, and staff. This spirit of cooperation on such a wide range of activities is also a testament to the leadership of CRKN's previous Chair, Dr. Annette Trimbee, who ably stewarded the organization through the last three years and set a precedent for excellence. By leveraging member library budgets collectively to support the needs of the research community and to transform scholarly communication, CRKN enables our institutions to truly accelerate Canadian research and innovation.

I look forward with eagerness to the achievements of the coming year at CRKN, and I am grateful for the opportunity to be a part of them.

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

What a wonderful year of progress and partnership at CRKN! Once again, the hard work of our Board, committees, task groups, and staff have led to meaningful outcomes for our membership and the wider Canadian research ecosystem. I'm pleased to report on some of our most significant achievements of the past year.

The Content Strategy Committee, alongside our staff Licensing Team, negotiated a cost-neutral transformative agreement with Wiley that is expected to result in over 4,000 new Canadian authored articles to be published open access. We also focused our efforts on Canadian partnerships for open access, working with Canadian Science Publishing (CSP) to offer a transformative agreement removing barriers to publishing in fourteen CSP journals, and with University of Toronto Press for access to the Journal of City Climate Policy and Economy through the innovative Subscribe to Open model. Finally, we renewed our long-standing partnership with Érudit for an additional two years, preparing for the launch of a long-term partnership agreement planned for 2025.

CRKN staff worked closely with the Preservation and Access Committee and stakeholders to add new user features to Canadiana and to expand the collections with two significant additions of member content – the McGill University Library Map collection, containing over 22,000 Canadian maps, and the University of Regina Student Publication collection. These projects, along with ongoing infrastructure development, are preparing us for our long-term goal of evolving Canadiana into world-leading infrastructure that brings together Canadian cultural and historical data into a single network to enable innovative research. We are working to support this development through an application to the Innovation Fund of the Canada Foundation for Innovation.


Underpinning much of our work, both in content licensing and in heritage infrastructure, is our support of persistent identifiers (PIDs). This year, we were fortunate to receive funding once again through the Digital Research Alliance of Canada to support the ORCID Canada and DataCite Canada consortia, and the development of a national PID strategy. We were also very pleased to welcome the Fonds de recherche du Québec to ORCID Canada this year as our newest consortium member and representative of government interest in PIDs and open scholarship.

As always, I thank our Board and committees for their dedicated oversight and guidance of CRKN's activities, which has made it the growing and vital organization it is today. My gratitude extends also to our staff, who provide the energy and insight that drive our objectives and who do the hard work of enacting our goals on behalf of our members. Finally, to the membership: thank you for your trust in CRKN, your willingness to support bold action, and your spirit of innovation and collaboration. It is an honour and a pleasure to serve such world-class institutions. As we begin another year of working together, I continue to be inspired by our shared achievements.



OUR PROGRAMS

Licensing and Negotiations

Working with librarians, researchers, administrators, funders, and publishers, CRKN undertakes large scale licensing of scholarly content for academic institutions in order to expand research capacity in Canada. Currently, CRKN negotiates and manages over 50 licenses on behalf of its member institutions.

Preservation and Heritage Collections

CRKN provides access to 62 million pages of Canadian documentary heritage through the Canadiana and H ritage collections and preserves this heritage through the Canadiana Trustworthy Digital Repository (TDR), ensuring its integrity and accessibility as technologies change over time. CRKN also provides digitization services to our member and stakeholder community, providing best-quality digital reproductions of materials that adhere to metadata and technology standards.

Persistent Identifiers

As CRKN works to advance access to knowledge, we believe that persistent identifiers (PIDs) are key to an efficient and interoperable research ecosystem. CRKN leads the ORCID Canada Consortium and co-manages the DataCite Canada Consortium with the Digital Research Alliance of Canada, providing critical support for these PIDs across the country. In addition, CRKN is currently leading in the development of a national PID strategy.

Financial Oversight and Sustainability

CRKN's professional finance staff, under the policy framework maintained by the Finance and Audit Committee (FAC), continue to administer over \$129M in annual expenditures on behalf of member institutions. The FAC also reviews and supports CRKN's internal risk management framework and budget development and monitoring process. This includes recommending budget and fee models which support CRKN's ongoing sustainability, and projecting budget decisions out over a five-year horizon.

Transforming Scholarly Communications

Alongside our members, we are changing Canada's research landscape, with an ever-increasing focus on equitable, sustainable, and open access to knowledge. CRKN is committed to advancing Canada as a leader in the shift towards open scholarship.

Develop and Foster Partnerships

CRKN is proud to partner with a range of organizations both in Canada and abroad to share knowledge, support initiatives, and spark ideas. We believe that ambitious, wide-reaching goals can only be achieved through collaboration.

Collaborative Advocacy

We take pride in our role as a voice for Canadian academic libraries. Whether by offering opportunities for members to discuss critical issues or by improving infrastructure and tools for the broader research landscape, advocacy is a key component of CRKN's mission.

Opinion

The summary financial statements, which comprise the summary statement of financial position as at March 31, 2023, and the summary statements of revenue and expenses for the year then ended, and related notes, are derived from the audited financial statements of Canadian Research Knowledge Network ("CRKN") for the year ended March 31, 2023.

1. Basis of presentation

The summary financial statements are derived from the complete set of financial statements of Canadian Research Knowledge Network ("CRKN") and they meet the recognition and measurement principles of Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. A listing of the significant accounting policies is described in the full statements, including financial instruments, revenue recognition, capital assets, and the use of estimates.

For the year ended March 31, 2023, CRKN estimates that \$25,584 of its receivables (\$25,584 in 2022) are likely uncollectible and has provided for that amount on its financial statements. The impairment results from an exceptional circumstance at one member institution and management is confident that it does not reflect a material change in the riskiness of CRKN's operating environments.

2. Nature of activities

The Canadian Research Knowledge Network ("CRKN") was incorporated on April 1, 2004, under the *Canada Corporations Act*, and continued on November 8, 2013, under the *Canada Not-for-Profit Corporations Act*.

CRKN's mission is to advance interconnected, sustainable access to the world's research and to Canada's documentary heritage content.

For CRKN member organizations and the diverse communities they serve, the organization empowers researchers, educators, and society with greater access to the world's research and Canada's preserved documentary heritage, now and for future generations.

3. Deferred revenue for license fees

Deferred revenue relates to amounts received or receivable from members for license fees for future fiscal years. CRKN matches its license revenue and corresponding license expenses monthly to the period to which the license pertains:

4. Deferred revenue for the Heritage program

Other deferred revenue relates to amounts received or receivable from members to support Heritage Programs and from clients for hosting fees for future fiscal years.

On October 20, 2017, the CRKN membership endorsed a business plan to integrate the operations of CRKN and Canadiana.org, including a three-year minimum commitment by members to redirect their existing expenditures on canadiana.org activities to the Heritage Content Access and Preservation fee ("HCAP").

On October 22, 2020, the CRKN membership endorsed an extension of the HCAP fee for a further three years until 2024.

5. Capital management

CRKN manages its capital to ensure that there are sufficient financial resources in place to deliver on the priorities set by the Board of Directors. CRKN does not have any short-term or long-term debt.

CRKN follows a budget monitoring and modification policy to routinely and systematically evaluate financial results to budget and, as required, inform the Finance and Audit Committee and Board of deviations.

CRKN also employs a net assets policy to govern management of net assets and to ensure responsible stewardship of organizational equity on behalf of members. In particular, the policy specifies a minimum and maximum limit to unrestricted net assets, and formally restricts net assets equivalent to 40% of its operation budget each year. For the year ended March 31, 2023, the Board of Directors approved the transfer of \$17,000 from internally restricted to unrestricted net assets (\$25,000 to internally restricted in 2022) to comply with the net assets policy and ensure sufficient funds for operational contingencies.

6. Commitments

CRKN has commitments for the rental of office equipment through to June 2025 in the amount of \$27,657.

During the year, CRKN received an estimated \$144,000 (\$144,000 in 2022) in consideration from a member in the form of free office rent. These offsetting amounts are shown on the statement of revenue and expenses as other revenue and as administration expenses, respectively.

At March 31, 2023, CRKN has a commitment for the purchase of US\$84,655,759 through the use of forward contracts to settle license obligations on behalf of its membership.
