Expanding the Collection

Canadiana Collection Development Project Results

Call for Canadiana Collection Development Projects

- Developed and guided by the Canadiana Content Sub-Committee
- Launched May 13, 2024
- 16 proposals received from 13 institutions across Canada
- Closed September 13, 2024



Selection Criteria and Priorities

HCPTG priorities

- Diversity and representation
- At-risk materials

Feasibility assessment

- Condition of material or quality of digitized files
- Permissions and copyright
- Privacy and sensitive content
- Metadata

Resource assessment

 Estimate of the time and resources a project will require

And the Projects are...

- Acadia University: The Athenaeum student newspaper
- CRKN will digitize issues between 1879 and 1930
- Part of a project at Acadia to celebrate the 150th anniversary of *The Athenaeum*



- Western University: London Advertiser newspaper
- CRKN will digitize issues from 1922–1936
- Adds more issues of the London Advertiser to Canadiana, which currently includes issues from 1890–November 1922



- Dalhousie University: Wayves/Gaezette, LGBTQ+ publication
- Dalhousie will share digitized issues with CRKN
- Represents a notable first LGBTQ+ collection in Canadiana!



- McGill University: Ontario Historical County Atlases
- McGill will provide new digital scans of these popular resources
- Improves Canadiana's existing collection of county atlases



- Our Digital World: Voice of the Fugitive and Provincial Freeman abolitionist newspapers
- ODW will share scans from original paper copies
- Expands Canadiana's collection of abolitionist publications



- University of Alberta: La Survivance Franco-Albertan newspaper
- University of Alberta will share digitized issues with CRKN
- Increases representation of francophone communities outside Quebec

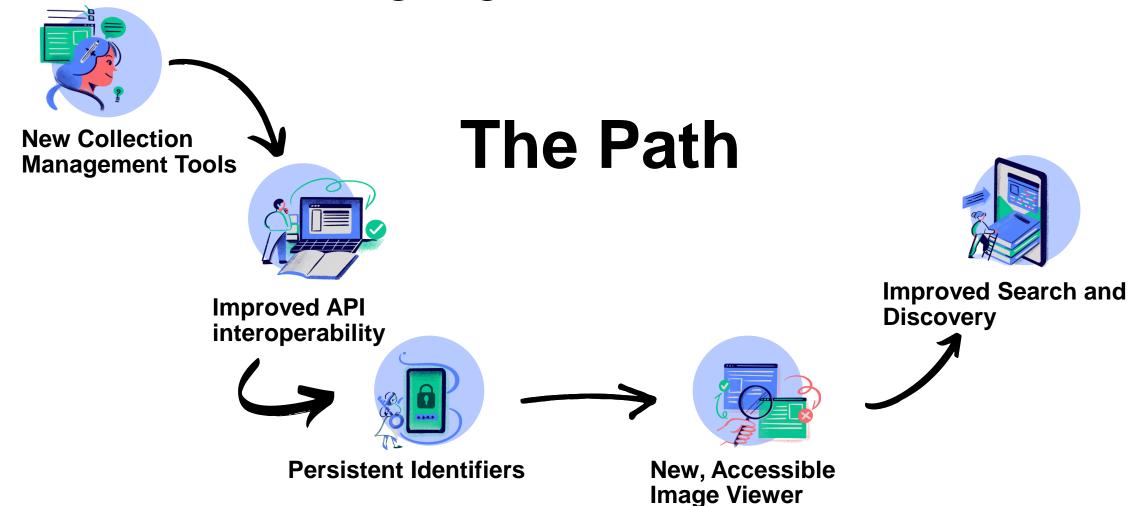

Future Proofing Access: Tools Connecting Digital Collections for Tomorrow



New and Improved Collection Management Tools

The **Digirati Manifest Editor** helps staff quickly organize, label, and fix digital images and metadata. It is especially helpful for staff who are putting together digital exhibits or collections and want to make sure the images are well-organized and easy for viewers to explore.



Production Q4 2024

Improved Interoperability

IIIF (International Image Interoperability Framework) is a set of standards for providing access to high-quality digital images from various cultural institutions online. It allows users to view, compare, and manipulate these images interactively, enhancing research and education opportunities.



Beta Q4 2024 Production Q3 2025

Persistent Identifiers

ARKs (Archival Resource Keys) ensure that all the digital objects—whether they're books, images, or documents—have stable, reliable links. No matter where the digital item is stored or how much the system changes, the ARK link will always take users to the right place.



Beta Q1 2025 Production Q3 2025

New, Improved, Accessible Image Viewer

Mirador is where users can interact with the digital images. They can open multiple images, zoom in to examine fine details, and even compare images side by side. It is especially useful for researchers or students who need to study and analyze images closely, or look through many images at once.



Beta Q2 2025 Production Q3 2025

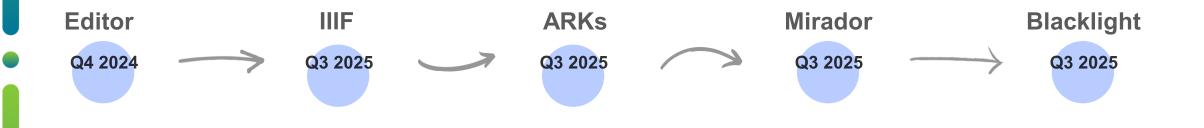
Improved Search and Discovery

Blacklight adds a powerful search engine to the platform, making it easy for users to find what they are looking for. It lets users search through the collection's metadata, filter results, and explore related materials.

Dependencies and Timeline



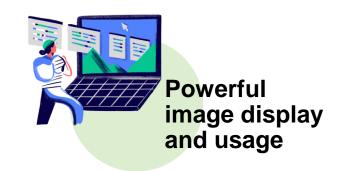

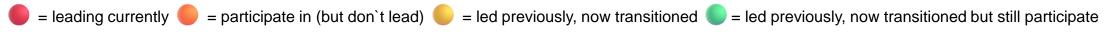

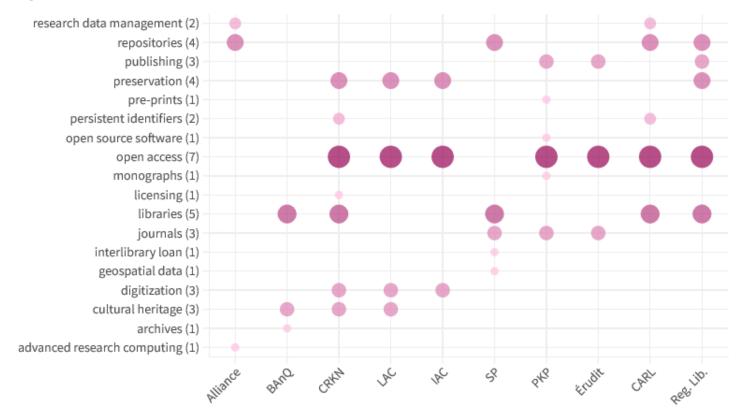
Main Areas of Activity: Organizations



Organization Sort: Keywords

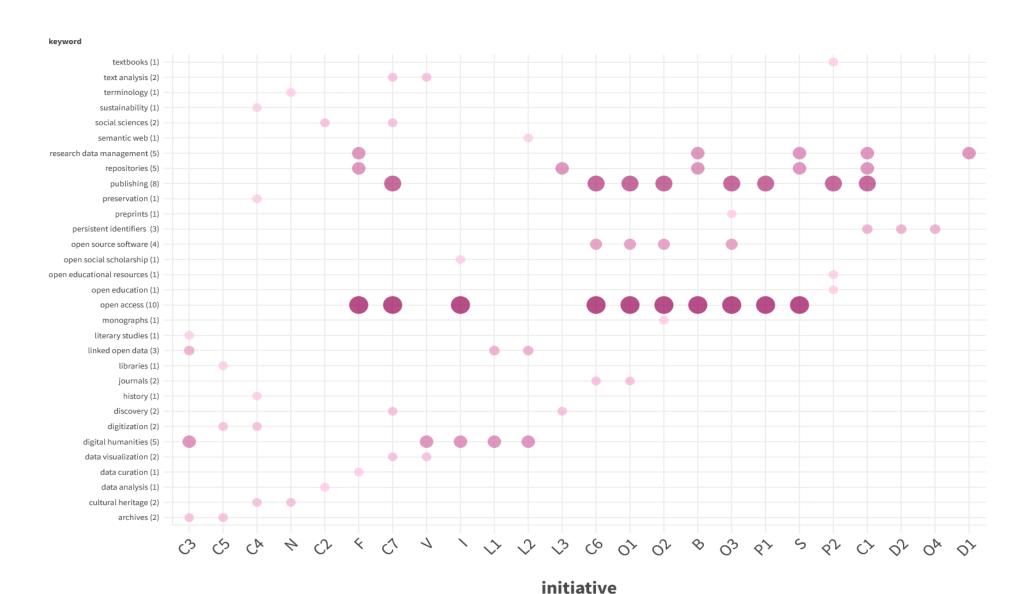

Analysis Outcomes

- Significant coverage of HSS DRI landscape
- Clusters around specific areas; certain areas have emerged as a shared priority across multiple organizations
 - OA
 - PIDs



Challenges Flagged in Conversation

- Underinvestment, funding, & sustainability
- Highly qualified personnel
- Collaborative leadership gap
- Implementation of standardization initiatives
- Nuanced access (e.g. to sensitive data)
- Lack of researcher knowledge on how to engage w/ HSS DRI
- Optimization for future interoperability

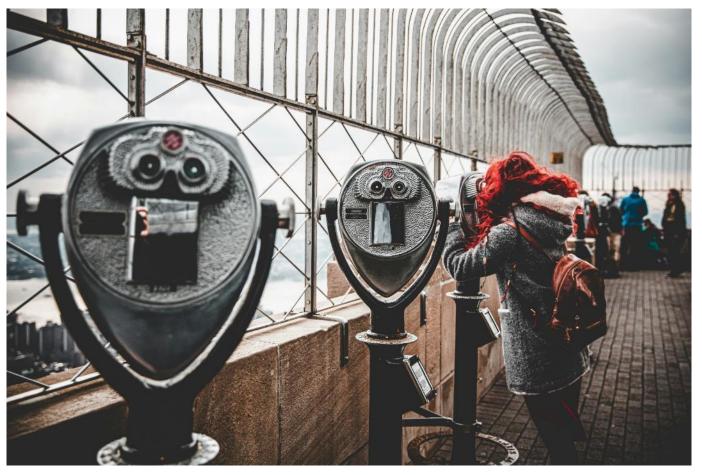

Proposal

 \$10M total toward enriching, improving access to, and engaging with the Canadiana data corpus

Goals

- Enable world-leading equity-focused historical and cultural research at an unprecedented scale
- Ensure that diverse stories of Canada's past responsibly inform the increasingly AI-engaged future
- Rebuild CRKN's Canadiana platform into cutting-edge open science infrastructure



Open Science Infrastructure for Canad(ian)a: Digital Collections of the Future

Status

- Selected as uOttawa's Stream 2 project
- Application well underway: NOI *just* submitted to CFI (full application due: February 2025)



Challenges and Opportunities

- Canadiana collections' partial
 histories and content is the legacy of
 our colonial, racist, and sexist past
 and present, and vital contextual
 information is missing or inaccessible
- The current interface is outdated and unhelpful
- There is limited/no machine or API access
- The data is siloed by limited interoperability with other collections

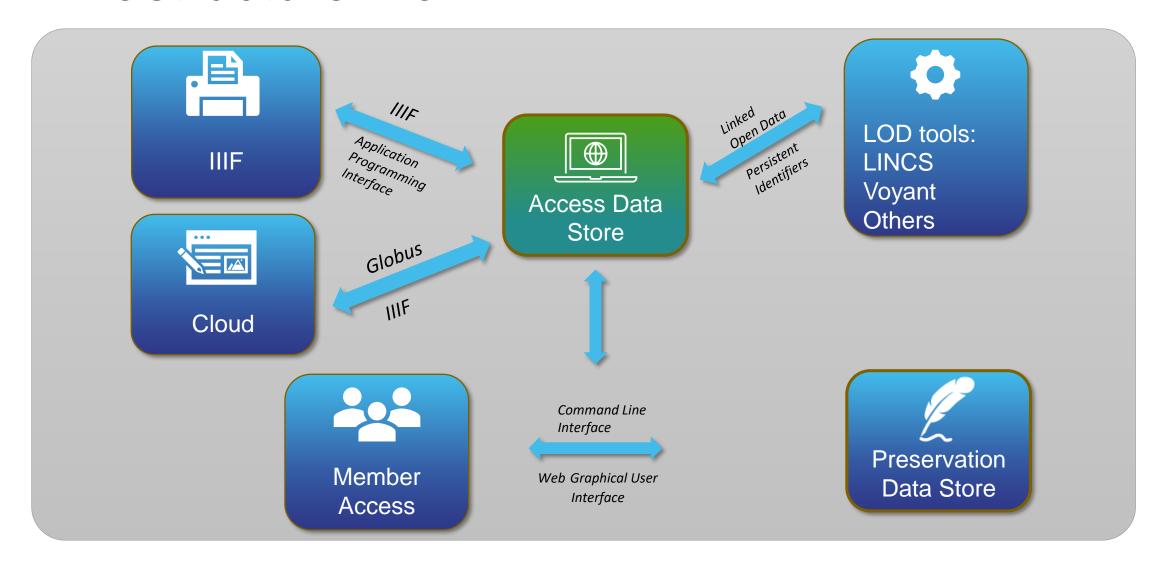
