Overview of Options

Following the first meeting of the Technology Sub-Committee, the interim report identified four approaches.

- 1) A **central database approach**, which would involve all descriptive records being loaded onto a central server.
- 2) A **Z39.50 approach**, which would involve all descriptive records and/or indexes stored on remote servers across the country, which would be searched from a central gateway and results brought to the central server via Z39.50.
- 3) A **central index approach**, which would involve indexes stored on a central server (or brought to a central server via Z39.50) and point to decentralized resources. This would mean that searches would actually be conducted on a central server, and users would then be pointed to decentralized descriptive records.
- 4) A **central search strategy**, wherein a central server would "broadcast" a search to the various remote servers across the country in a format specific to each of the remote servers. This method would broadcast the search in a format consistent with the search engine for each server. The central server would then collect the results, collate them into a specified report format and produce an HTML page with pointers to the decentralized resources. In a sense, this is a hybrid of options 2) and 3), insofar as a search is broadcast and run individually on each remote server, however the results would come back to the researcher in the form of pointers to those decentralized resources. This approach was uncovered during our discussions with a vendor. Although the vendor suggested that it is a option which "in theory" could work, it is untested. The Sub-Committee dismissed this option as too risky and did not pursue any further research into it.

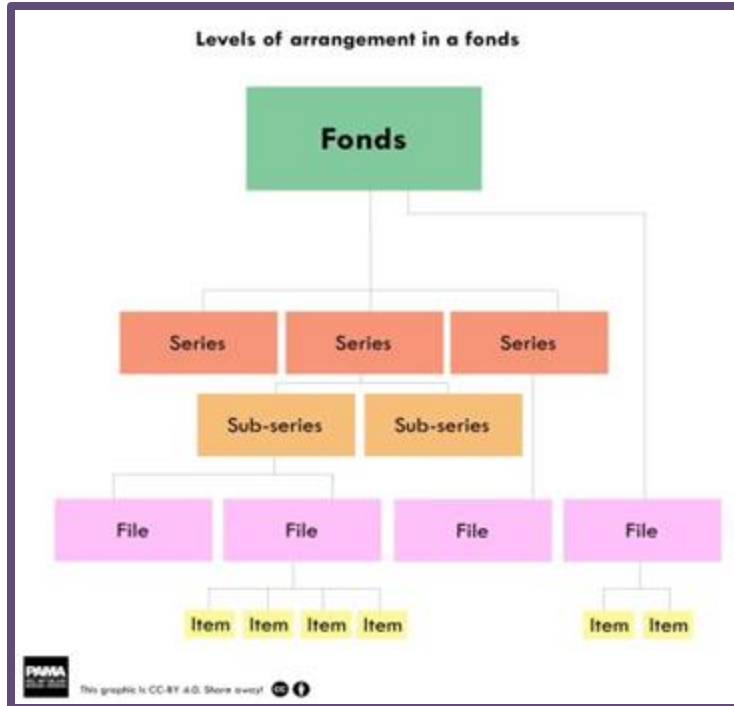

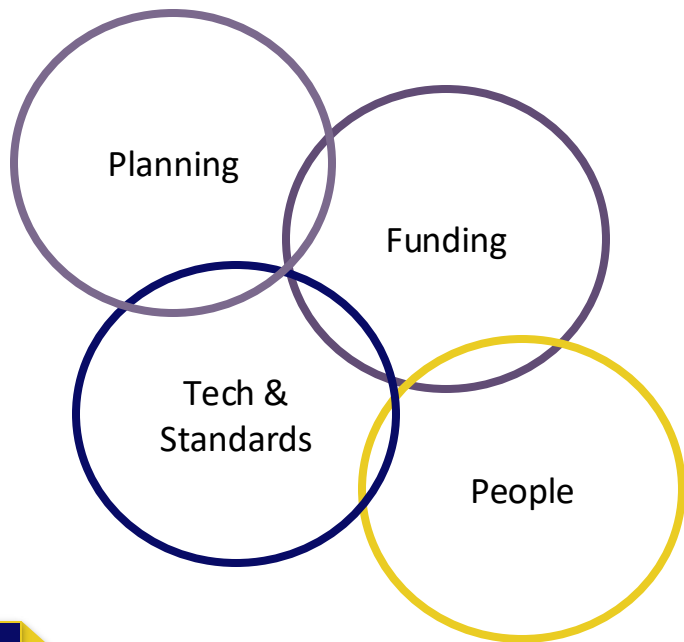

8. (e) Stability of Funding

This question asked if the method and amount of funding is stable or if it is expected to change in the next 1-2 years. An explanation of any expected change was also requested. Four provinces (NS, QC, SK, AB) reported that relatively stable funding was anticipated for this time period.

NL	Our funding for training [of member institutions] is dependent on NADP support.
NS	Appears stable for the next 2 years.
NB	N/A
PE	Depends on NADP for the training fund; funding for other network-related training, upgrades or activities is not anticipated.
QC	Amounts should remain about the same, except the funding will have to increase slightly if the project to improve the network is carried out.
ON	No, relies on NADP grant and volunteer contributions.
MB	We have no resources to maintain a network; we are totally dependent on the generosity of the University of Saskatchewan.

What is past is prologue.



Lessons


- Staff & policies are needed to encourage data standardization (& review)
- Technology will expire; budgeting for maintenance is essential
- Resilient business cases must identify more than a single OTO funding stream
- Collaboration across GLAM is needed (community building; advocacy; participation incentives)
- Technology without iterative UX testing cannot evolve; online user behaviour will inevitably change

DEMOGRAPHICS: EN and FR Practitioners & Researchers in Canada



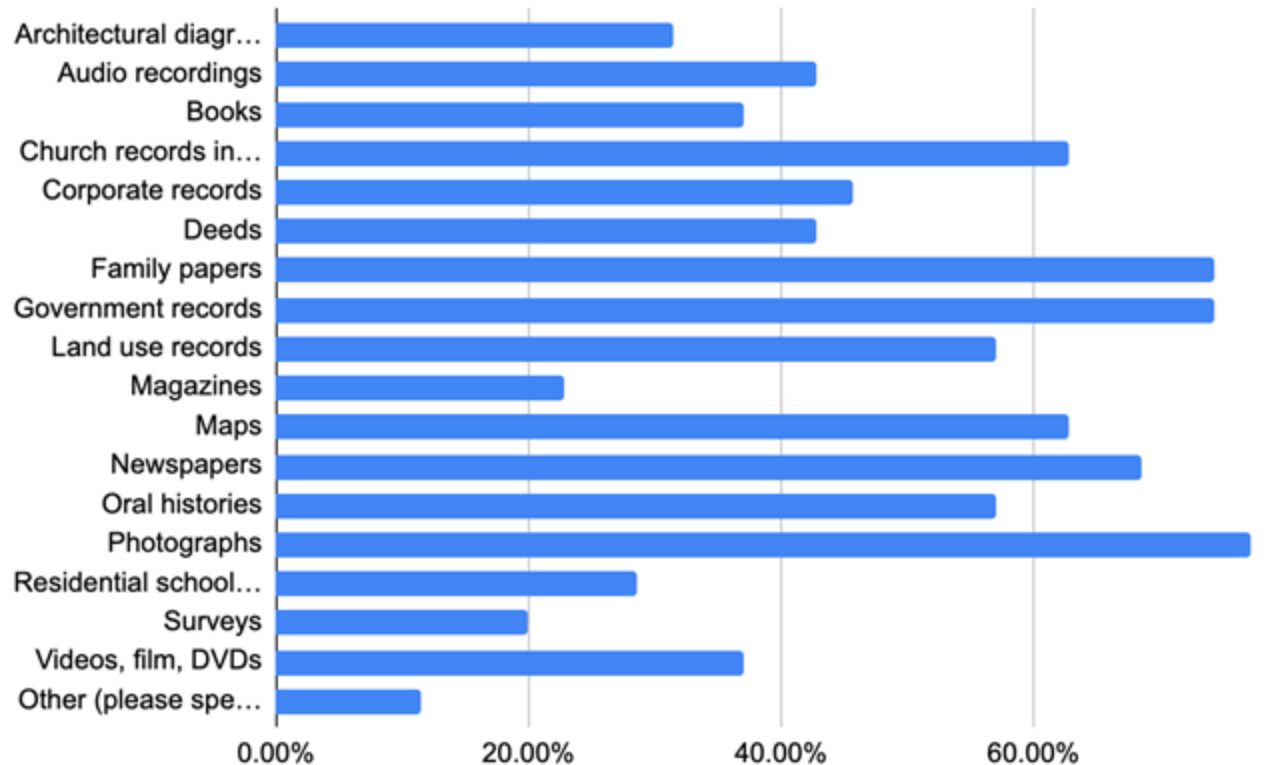
Q2R. WHAT TYPE OF INSTITUTION ARE YOU AFFILIATED WITH?

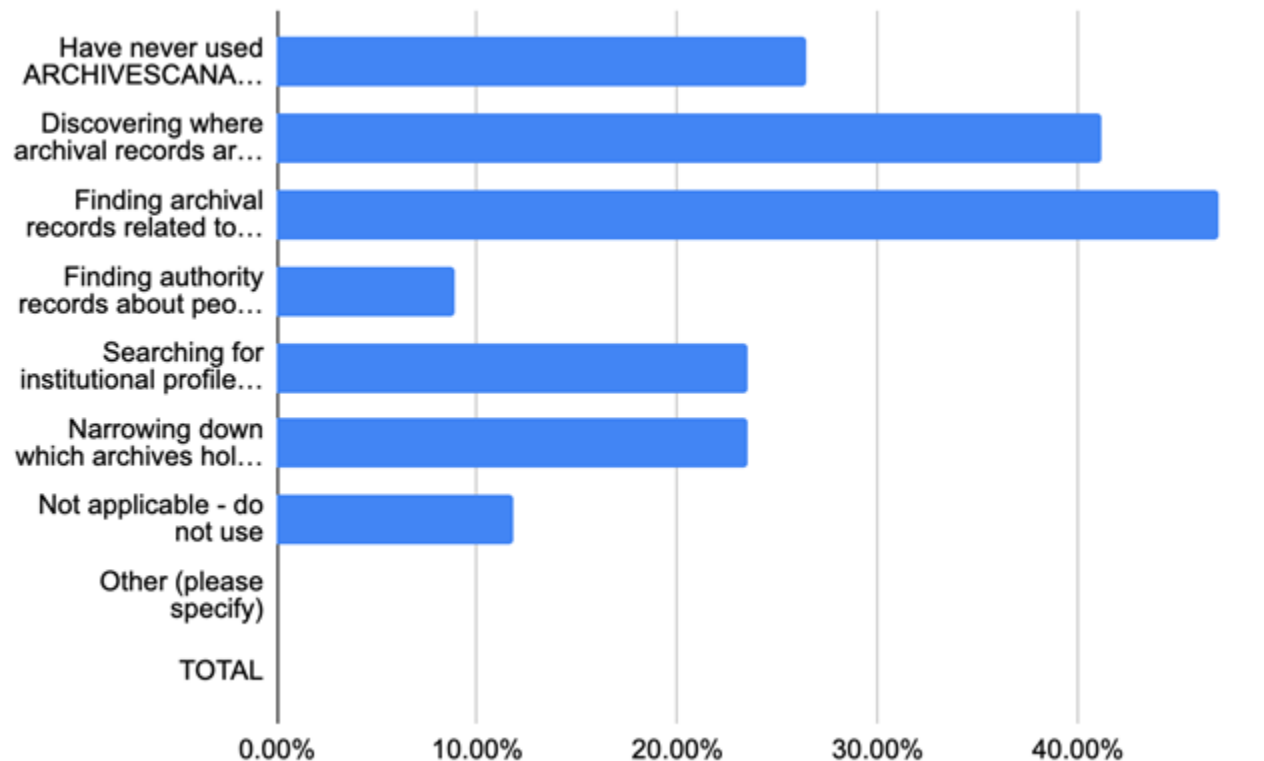
Q5R. WHAT TYPE OF RESEARCH DO YOU UNDERTAKE?



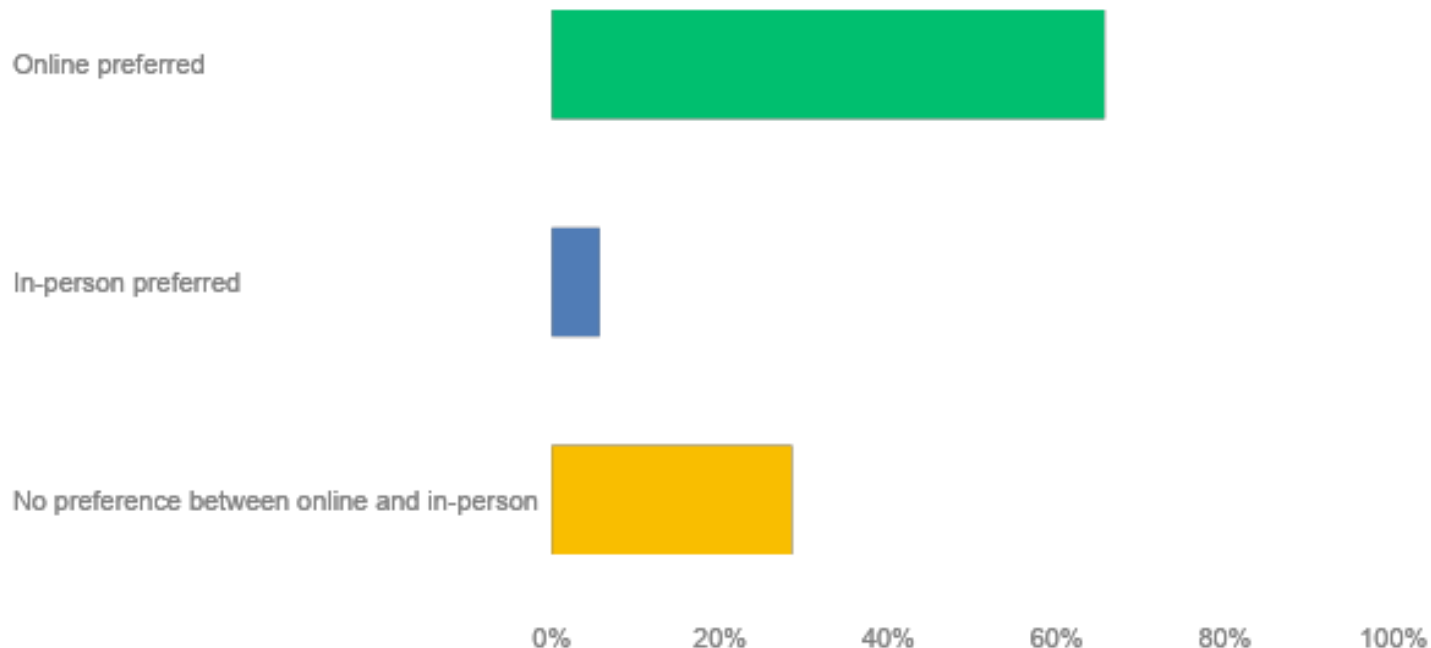
Q7R. WHAT TYPE OF ARCHIVAL MATERIAL WOULD ASSIST IN YOUR RESEARCH?



Q14. WHAT WAS YOUR PURPOSE FOR USING ARCHIVES CANADA?



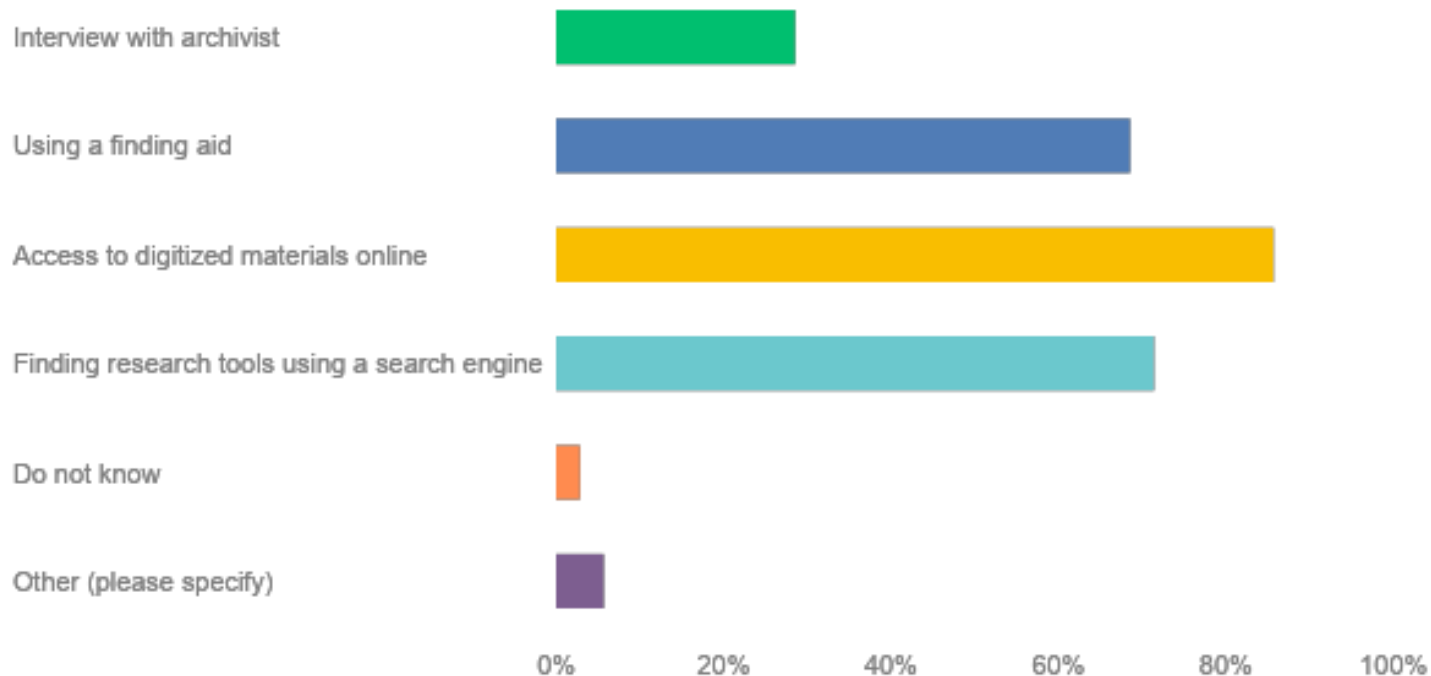
Q8R. HOW DO YOU PREFER TO ACCESS ARCHIVAL RESOURCES?

CONCLUSIONS: PRACTITIONERS

Most practitioners do not want ARCHIVESCANADA.ca to be discontinued.

A majority of practitioners are interested in starting or continuing to use ARCHIVESCANADA.ca but are unsure how to add content or edit content already posted on the site (descriptions, authorities, institutional profiles).

Practitioners indicated coordination between ARCHIVESCANADA.ca and provincial/territorial association databases was necessary.

CONCLUSIONS: RESEARCHERS

A national finding aid system is important and ARCHIVESCANADA.ca is potentially useful (content is outdated).

Need for more digitized content, faster search functions, and more up-to-date information.

Researchers also indicated coordination between ARCHIVESCANADA.ca and provincial/territorial association databases was necessary.
